Ways to address the problem



Strengthen institutional memory



Strategy from the centre



- ✓ Heads of policy profession should be held accountable for institutional memory
 ✓ Key officials should be
- Key officials should be kept in post over the longer term
- Repositories of previous work must be made available



- ✓ No. 10, Treasury and Cabinet Office must set firm and enduring priorities for officials and ministers
- ✓ Cabinet Office and secretaries should play a greater role in scrutinising policy proposals which propose major change



Make organisational change harder



Strengthen policy development process



- ✓ The Treasury and NAO should analyse past organisational change costs and challenge new proposals
 ✓ Parliament should
- scrutinise business cases for new organisations



- ✓ Policy announcements should include their evidence base
- ✓ Departments should acknowledge previous experiences in all new proposals
 ✓ Outsiders should be
- involved in the policy process
